Remaking of Political History Conference – Call for Papers – DEADLINE: 12/15/18

The deadline is fast approaching for the Remaking Political History Conference at Purdue University on **June 6-7, 2019**. Convened by Kathryn Cramer Brownell of Purdue, Leah Wright Rigueur of Harvard's Kennedy School, and former National Fellow Nicole Hemmer of U.Va.'s Miller Center, the conference will be an inclusive conversation with a diverse range of historians to explore what new scholarship in the field looks like. Conference leaders will push participants to rethink the boundaries of what constitutes American political history and to strategize ways to disseminate historical scholarship within and outside the academy.

The conference will also create opportunities for historians to share new research and build networks within the field and with a range of public-facing platforms including C-SPAN, Backstory, Past Present Podcast, Public Seminar, Bunk, *The Washington Post's* Made By History, and more. BHC Doctoral Colloquium in Business History

The BHC Doctoral Colloquium in Business History will be held once again in conjunction with the 2019 BHC annual meeting. This prestigious workshop, funded by Cambridge University Press, will take place in Cartagena, Columbia on **Wednesday, March 13 and Thursday, March 14**. Typically limited to 10 students, the Colloquium is open to doctoral candidates who are pursuing dissertation research within the broad field of business history, from any relevant discipline (e.g., from economic sociology, political science, cultural anthropology, or management, as well as history).

Most participants are in year 3 or 4 or their degree program, though in some instances applicants at a later stage make a compelling case that their thesis research had evolved in ways that led them to see the advantages of an intensive engagement with business history.

Note that "environmental humanities" is used in the broadest sense, meaning anyone who works on environmental topics from an environmental perspective, not someone who primarily does literary criticism. Anyone who is an environmental historian is eligible.

ASU is hiring two lines in environmental humanities—one in the School of Historical, Philosophical, and Religious Studies (SHPRS) and one in the School of International Letters and Cultures (SILC). Enviro-historians should be sure to apply to the SHPRS position. ASU is a very exciting place to be working on environmental topics, and current and former students are encouraged to apply.
