This past year was the 44th in the Foundation's history. It was one of the most successful in our history, and it witnessed the graduation of the 1,000th holder of a Jefferson Scholarship. This letter will provide the impressive results that 2023–24 produced.

Undergraduate Programs

In May, the Jefferson Scholars Program finalized its 44th entering class, and the Walentas Scholars Program finalized its third. There will be 34 Jefferson Scholars and 12 Walentas Scholars in the Class of 2028. They hail from 20 different states and one foreign country.

Both competitions saw a record number of completed nominations: a total of 2,741 across both programs. Over 1,000 UVA alumni and friends of the Foundation were involved in our selection processes. There is no entity at any university of which we are aware that involves as many volunteers in such meaningful service.

The recruiting power of the two programs remains significant. Approximately 470 Jefferson and Walentas nominees will be members of the First Year Class, nearly 12 percent of those entering UVA. Our reach will expand further next year when we add Atlanta, Boston, and Los Angeles to the Walentas competition.

The contributions of our Scholars to the University community remain outstanding. This past year, one of our Scholars was named a Rhodes Scholar, the 13th in our history to receive this award. We also had a Scholar receive a Goldwater Scholarship; another received a Truman Scholarship. Scholars also received a Fulbright Scholarship and a James C. Gaither Junior Fellowship at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. Next year, a Scholar will serve as the student representative to the Board of Visitors, and another will serve as the chair of the Judiciary Committee.


Scholar alumni continued to distinguish themselves as exceptional leaders in 2023–24. Maurie McInnis (JS '88) was named the first female president of Yale University; Jasmine Yoon (JS '03) was confirmed as Virginia's first Asian American federal judge; Xiao Wang (JS '08) joined the faculty at UVA's School of Law and received the Harold Berman Award for Excellence in Scholarship by the Association of American Law Schools; Marissa Reddy (JS '16) was named one of five UVA alumni on the Forbes "30 Under 30" list; and Nathan Abraham (JS '20) received a Knight-Hennessy Scholarship to study law at Stanford University.

Graduate Programs

Our Graduate Fellowship Program also produced outstanding results. There were 58 Jefferson and National Fellows supported by the Foundation last year. Twenty-seven new Fellows will join us in the fall. They hold degrees from 36 different universities and bring a wide range of interdisciplinary experience to the community. Of particular note is that one of our Jefferson Fellow alumni, Matt Pryal, was nominated by the chair of UVA's astronomy department for the Foundation's Award for Excellence in Teaching. He emerged as a winner this year, the first alumnus of the program to do so.

Distinguished Professorship Program

The Foundation's Distinguished Professorship Program made great strides in 2023–24. There were seven exceptional scholars on the faculty holding Jefferson Scholars Foundation Distinguished Professorships. Two more professors will hold Foundation-funded Professorships this coming year, and a third will be joining the faculty in 2025–26. As many as five new searches will be launched in 2024–25.

The holders of our chairs are world-class intellects who are engaging classroom teachers. This fall, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences inducted into its ranks Danielle Citron, the Jefferson Scholars Foundation Schenck Distinguished Professor in Law. The impact all of our professors are making on the lives of their current students and on our Jefferson Scholars community is profound.

Foundation Initiatives

In addition to the programs mentioned above, the Foundation supports several initiatives that bring talented leaders and scholars to the Foundation. We are privileged to help with efforts like Governing America in a Global Era (GAGE) and the Center for the Study of the Age of Jefferson. Through our Shadwell Society Speaker Series and the Chauncey Lecture Series, we bring award-winning authors, historians, and political and industry leaders to the community. This year, Georgia Hunter, UVA alumna and author of *We Were the Lucky Ones*, was the Shadwell Speaker, and Will Thomas, professor of history at the University of Nebraska, delivered the Chauncey lecture.

In Conclusion

The Jefferson Scholars Foundation throughout its history has benefited from the commitment of a strong Board of Directors. This year, three board members' terms ended. Robert Byron, Lonnie Howell, and Anna Nekoranec provided outstanding service, and their active involvement on the Board will be missed. Three new members will be joining the Board, and we look forward to the contributions that Teddy Kaplan, Rob Wadsworth, and Shan Wu will make.

Each year the Foundation suffers the loss of some of its loyal friends. Jim Bailey, Lee Brown, Everette Doffermyre, Sandy Gilliam, Jennifer Giotto, Al Horton, John Lillard, and Henry Valentine were steadfast and generous friends, and we are grateful for their unwavering commitment to, and confidence in, our mission. We also were deeply saddened by the death of one of our Scholars, Elijah Witt.

The success the Foundation continues to enjoy would not be possible without the generous support provided by our many friends and benefactors. The past year the Foundation received \$33.5 million in new commitments and matching funds. Such generosity has created a community defined by excellence and merit, and we are deeply grateful to all who continue to recognize the power of rewarding those individuals who demonstrate those traits.

Development

The 2023–24 fiscal year represented a philanthropic milestone for the Foundation, raising over \$22.5 million in new funds and securing \$11 million in matching funds from the University. This notable combined total marks one of the most significant fundraising years for the Foundation in the past decade.

The impact of this year's financial support will resonate for generations. Three new Jefferson Scholars Foundation Distinguished Professorships will spearhead innovative initiatives on Grounds. The William L. and Carolyn K. Polk Distinguished University Professorship will attract a world-class University Professor to the College of Arts & Sciences. The John A. and Anne M. Koch Distinguished Professorship and the Pausic Family Distinguished Professorship will elevate the Department of Systems and Information Engineering in the Engineering School, clearing the path for it to emerge as a global leader in the field. The Foundation's relationship with the department is further strengthened by the creation of several fellowships designated specifically to support these Distinguished Professorships.

Moreover, philanthropy is expanding opportunities for Jefferson and Walentas Scholar candidates. Through a challenge from an anonymous benefactor, the Foundation raised over \$3 million to support outstanding finalists with financial need, enabling many outstanding Jefferson and Walentas finalists who did not receive the scholarship to attend UVA and, in turn, enrich the University community.

Additionally, this year's financial support will allow the Foundation to expand its reach by launching new Walentas Scholarship regions in Atlanta, Boston, and Los Angeles in the fall of 2024.

The Foundation has played a pivotal role in the University of Virginia's "Honor the Future" Capital Campaign. The University's goal is to secure \$377.8 MILLION SECURED DURING THE "HONDR THE FUTURE" CAMPAIGN \$333.5 MILLION IN TOTAL NEW FUNDS RAISED

funding for 10 University Professorships, and the Foundation has been responsible for securing funding for six of those \$10 million endowed professorships. To date, the Foundation has raised endowments that will fund 17 additional Distinguished Professors who will educate UVA students for many years to come. With one year of the Campaign remaining, the Foundation has raised more than \$377.8 million in new funds.

With an eye toward the future, the Jefferson Scholars Foundation remains steadfast in its pursuit of excellence. We are deeply grateful for the extraordinarily generous support from our many friends and benefactors.

Benefactors

The Jefferson Scholars Foundation offers its benefactors the opportunity to name Scholarships, Fellowships, and Professorships. Jefferson Scholarships may be created with gifts totaling \$1 million. Named Walentas Scholarships and Jefferson Fellowships may be created with gifts totaling \$500,000. Professorships have a naming level of \$5 million.

Finance

Investment Return

The Foundation finished fiscal year 2023–24 with a weighted average return of 6.8 percent from its cash and investments portfolio. The investment performance of UVIMCO, which holds approximately 90 percent of the Foundation's portfolio, continued to drive the Foundation's rate of return. The Foundation's total endowment value (including cash and investments, pledge balances, and deferred gifts) as of June 30, 2024 was \$874.7 million, an increase of \$53.8 million from fiscal year-end 2022–23.

Approximately 53 percent of the Foundation's total endowment value is restricted to support for Jefferson and Walentas Scholarships. The remaining total endowment value supports Jefferson Distinguished Professorships (19 percent), Jefferson and National Fellowships (17 percent), and other purposes (11 percent).

During fiscal year 2023–24, the Foundation's financial resources supported numerous noteworthy initiatives, including funding the second class of Walentas Scholars and seventh Jefferson Distinguished Professor; expanding the loan replacement awards offered to Scholarship finalists who enroll at the University; supporting Jefferson Fellows who assumed postdoctoral teaching positions in the new College Engagements curriculum; hosting two highly successful in-person recruitment weekends following the virtual selection of Jefferson and Walentas Scholarship finalists; and providing meaningful enrichment opportunities for Scholars, Fellows, and Distinguished Professors to build connections within the Foundation's community.

Philanthropic support from the Foundation's thoughtful, generous benefactors remained strong during the fiscal year. The Foundation received \$3.5 million in new gifts, \$3.6 million in new deferred gifts, and \$15.4 million in new pledges. The Foundation continues to leverage the University's bicentennial matching funds program, receiving new commitments from the University in fiscal year 2023–24 for \$11 million.

Operational and Capital Spending

Similar to the previous fiscal year, the Foundation's operating and capital expenditures were under budget in fiscal year 2023–24. Actual operational and capital spending was \$27.2 million, nearly 3 percent under the \$27.9 million budget. The allocation of expenses across functional areas resulted in 81.3 percent being used for program support, 10.2 percent for development needs, and the remaining 8.5 percent for administrative costs. The Foundation's three-year weighted average endowment spend rate was 4.2 percent.

The approved operating and capital expenditure budget for fiscal year 2024–25 increased by approximately \$2.7 million to \$30.6 million. Over \$2.3 million of this increase represents additional spending on Jefferson and Walentas Scholarships, Jefferson and National Fellowships, Jefferson Distinguished Professorships, and undergraduate awards. We anticipate program spending will comprise approximately 83 percent of total expenditures.


Financial Principles



The Foundation utilizes the resulting investment earnings to fund its operating expenses. This conservative funding approach has supported over four decades of operations and should continue to provide a stable financing source for future generations of extraordinary students and faculty.

Conclusion

The Foundation's financial position is strong. By remaining focused on long-term growth and our commitment to prudent fiscal management, the Foundation is well-poised to support the organization's 2025–2030 strategic planning process.

UPDATE : On September 21, 2023, the Foundation presented a special evening with UVA alumna and *New York Times* bestselling author Georgia Hunter. When Georgia was 15 years old, she learned that she came from a family of Holocaust survivors. Her book, *We Were the Lucky Ones*, was born of her decade-long quest to uncover her family's staggering history. Today, the book has landed in the hands of over one million readers, having been translated into 16 foreign languages. Recently, it was optioned by Hulu as a limited series. Warren F. Chauncey Lecture Series in American History

Featuring renowned historians, authors, or public officials on a range of topics pertaining to American history. UPDATE : On February 22, 2024, the Foundation presented the 2024 Warren F. Chauncey Lecture Series in American History featuring UVA alumnus and historian William G. Thomas III. Thomas delivered a lecture entitled "Dred Scott's America: Law and Freedom from Virginia to Upper Mississippi." In 1857, the U.S. Supreme Court handed down its decision in the Dred Scott case, shocking Americans and fueling the national crisis over slavery. Thomas explored the story of this landmark case and the continental struggle over slavery, sovereignty, and citizenship in the years leading up to the Civil War.



William G. Thomas III is a professor of history and the John and Catherine Angle Chair in the Humanities at the University of Nebraska.

Age of Jefferson

The Center for the Study of the Age of Jefferson approaches the ideas and legacies of Thomas Jefferson through a wide lens by bringing together experts on the Atlantic World, the colonial era, and the early American Republic.

Under the direction of Professor Christa Dierksheide, this interdisciplinary institute is funded by the Jefferson Scholars Foundation and embraces a new approach to training the next generation of early Americanists. The Center enables UVA doctoral students to expand their expertise in a wide variety of methodologies, including digital history, material culture, and public history. A hub for scholarship, teaching, and public engagement, the Center fosters a vibrant intellectual community at the University of Virginia and contributes to a richer understanding of the American past.

ALEX MACKAY comes to UVA from Harvard Business School, where he taught and co-led the Pricing Lab at the Digital, Data, and Design Institute. MacKay is a distinguished researcher whose work combines theory and practical measurement to uncover new insights about price competition and consumer preferences. He explores how strategic pricing decisions are influenced by factors like algorithms, long-term contracts, vertical restraints, and changing consumer behavior.

His work has important implications for both businesses and regulators and has garnered citations in major media outlets, such as *The New York Times*, *Financial Times*, *TIME*, and National Public Radio. It also has been featured



in the Economic Report of the President, an annual report produced by the Council of Economic Advisers.

MacKay holds a Ph.D. in economics from the University of Chicago. Prior to his doctoral studies, he gained valuable experience at a consulting firm specializing in the design and analysis of business experiments. He also holds a B.A. in economics from UVA.

ANDREW PRESTON has spent the last 20 years teaching history at Clare College at Cambridge University. He specializes in the history of American foreign relations, primarily since 1898. His teaching and research interests lie in three main areas: the ideas and concepts that motivate and shape America's behavior in the world at both the elite and popular levels; the mechanics of foreign policymaking in Washington; and the intersections between the national and the international, the foreign and the domestic, including the influence of domestic politics and culture—particularly religion—on the conduct of U.S. foreign policy. In addition to his scholarly work, which includes

several books, book chapters, and articles, Preston is a

frequent contributor to the *Toronto Globe & Mail*, and he has also written for the *Washington Post*, *The New Republic*, *London Review of Books*, *USA Today*, *History Today*, *Boston Globe*, *New Statesman*, *Foreign Affairs*, and the *TLS*, among others. He serves on the editorial boards of the journals *Modern American History*, *The Historical Journal*, *Rhetoric & Public Affairs*, and *Diplomacy & Statecraft*. He also sits on the Scholarly Advisory Board of the Gilder Lehrman Institute and is a Distinguished Lecturer of the

Organization of American Historians.

Preston earned a master's in international history at London School of Economics and holds a Ph.D. in history from Cambridge University.



RENOWNED FOR HIS pioneering work utilizing nanotechnology to combat cancer, glaucoma, and heart disease, among other diseases and ailments, Dr. Evan Scott is set to lead UVA's Institute for Nanoscale Scientific and Technological Advanced Research, or nanoSTAR, amidst the launch of the Paul and Diane Manning Institute of Biotechnology.

Scott brings to UVA more than a decade of experience teaching and spearheading groundbreaking research at Northwestern University. His work, which has been generously funded by the National Institutes of Health, applies principles from biomaterials science, nanotechnology, and tissue engineering towards the development of translational immunotherapies.

With over 80 publications, 21 patents, and nearly 30 career-affirming awards, including the National Science Foundation CAREER Award, the Nano Research Young Innovator Award in Nanobiotechnology, the Biomedical Engineering Society Mid-Career Award, the BMES Young Innovator of Cellular and Molecular Bioengineering, Scott brings a wealth of expertise and scholarly recognition to UVA. He will hold dual appointments in both the School of Medicine and the School of Engineering and Applied Science. In addition, he will support UVA's Cancer Center and will work to foster interdisciplinary collaborations across Grounds.

FIVE RECIPIENTS WERE SELECTED to receive the Award for Excellence in Teaching and the Hartfield Excellence in Teaching Award, with the Foundation awarding a total of \$25,000.

The Foundation called on department chairs and deans from across the University to nominate full-time faculty for its Award for Excellence in Teaching. Additionally, department chairs from the Engineering School were encouraged to nominate faculty for the Hartfield Award. A panel of previous award recipients selected this year's winners, who were recognized at a ceremony held at the Foundation.



Brian Helmke

School of Engineering and Applied Science, Biomedical Engineering

RESEARCH FOCUS: Professor Helmke examines the relationship between cell mechanics and cell function using new tools in materials science and molecular biology, with a focus on cardiovascular disease.

NOMINATION HIGHLIGHT: "Professor Helmke approaches teaching with tremendous creativity and passion. He brings these attributes both to the classroom setting and to the advising of undergraduate research in his laboratory. He had the idea for and mentored the creation of the Starting an Undergraduate Research Experience (SURE) program in BME, which helped dozens of undergraduate students gain research experiences they might not otherwise have had. In the past three years, he has mentored 31 undergraduate researchers."



Natasha Smith

School of Engineering and Applied Science, Mechanical Engineering

RESEARCH FOCUS: Professor Smith studies systems engineering and the design process, reliability assessment and design, prediction of material properties, and structural system responses using statistical methods.

NOMINATION HIGHLIGHT: "Professor Smith is the most dedicated and hard-working professor I have ever known. She routinely and voluntarily carries twice the teaching load expected of general faculty. In addition, she teaches the most intensive laboratory courses, which require supervision of several graduate student teaching assistants, shop technicians, and a wide variety of experimental laboratory equipment. Such off-the-charts levels of contribution would seem to completely preclude high-quality teaching, but she is one of the most admired teachers by students, by staff and by her faculty colleagues."





Kevin Grise

College of Arts & Sciences, Environmental Sciences

RESEARCH FOCUS: Professor Grise examines atmospheric dynamics and their role in variability and long-term change in the climate system.

NOMINATION HIGHLIGHT: "Professor Grise meets students wherever they are academically, tailors projects to the interests of every individual, and facilitates student engagement with the material in productive ways through thoughtfully crafted, hands-on assignments. Often, he prepares his materials months in advance to give himself the opportunity to think deeply about the organization of his courses and refine his approach."

Matt Pryal

College of Arts & Sciences, Astronomy

RESEARCH FOCUS: Professor Pryal completed his Ph.D. at UVA in 2020 as a Jefferson Fellow. His research focuses on the atmospheres and orbits of hot Jupiter exoplanets.

NOMINATION HIGHLIGHT: "Professor Pryal has a fabulous combination of teaching qualities: youthful energy and enthusiasm, humor, respect for his audience, and a brilliant clarity of expression which is so important in a technical subject like astronomy. I have watched him both in a class setting and in a public setting and been so impressed (indeed, envious) of his ability to hold his audience, react spontaneously, sprinkle humorous asides, and instill awe and excitement."

Sylvia Tidey

Pan-University Global Studies Program

RESEARCH FOCUS: Professor Tidey's areas of specialty cover a wide spectrum and include corruption, bureaucracy, the state, kinship, sexuality, gender, HIV/AIDS, phenomenological anthropology, and Southeast Asia.

NOMINATION HIGHLIGHT: "I have watched students respond to Professor Tidey's infallibly positive classroom presence and demeanor many times. She is remarkably flexible and quick to adapt the format of a class to students' interests and needs. Her adaptability is on display in individual settings as well as a larger class setting. One of her skills I have come to admire most is her responsiveness to students' differences. She is able to diagnose a struggling student's problem and help them through it, but she is equally able to help accelerate an advanced student's intellectual growth."



Scholars of Extraordinary Range and Depth

Five Jefferson Scholars and one alumnus received an array of international awards this year, exemplifying the community's intellectual diversity and characteristic excellence.





IS IT POSSIBLE TO DESCRIBE THE AVERAGE Jefferson or Walentas Scholar? Participants in

the competitive undergraduate program excel in a wide range of disciplines, and that academic diversity is by design. Rather than encouraging all Scholars to study the same handful of subjects, the Jefferson Scholars Foundation empowers each student to choose their own path.

"We don't care what their area of passion might be, but we want them to find it and pour their energy into it," says Jimmy Wright, president of the Jefferson Scholars Foundation. "We don't have any cookie-cutter model here other than exceptional talent."

This year, five Jefferson Scholars and one alumnus earned prestigious international awards:

the Rhodes, Truman, Goldwater, Fulbright, and Knight-Hennessy Scholarships, as well as the Carnegie Endowment's Gaither Junior Fellowship. The recipients represent a broad spectrum of fields, from public health to poetry.


Across the Foundation's history, about 10 percent of all graduates have earned similar honors. Maintaining that level of achievement starts with the selection process, where volunteers search for students who have multiple interests-and possess the drive to explore them in depth. "Our selection committees are comprised mostly of UVA alumni and, like the high school students who are nominated for Jefferson and Walentas Scholarships, they come from all walks of life," says Ben Skipper, vice president of the Jefferson Scholars Foundation. "They aren't looking for just one type of success. They are looking for students who possess both depth and range, existing in tandem."

Rigorous curiosity and a range of intellectual interests only form part of the

equation, however. The Foundation seeks not only excellent scholars and leaders, but also outstanding citizens: students who aspire to support their peers and improve the world. "When you're surrounded by people who are good-hearted, you can take risks that you might not have been willing to take otherwise," says Jimmy. "You don't win these kinds of awards without taking risks."

In the company of such peers, and with the Foundation's support, Scholars can make the most of their talents and pursue their true passions. "The Jefferson Scholars community provides an affirmation that your journey is your own to take," Ben says. That journey has looked different for each of this year's six award-winners, who demonstrate that there is no average Jefferson or Walentas Scholar—in any sense of the word.

Catherine Cossaboom

JS '25, Mathematician and Advocate

BARRY GOLDWATER SCHOLAR | J. MACK ROBINSON Jefferson Scholar



When Catherine Cossaboom first interviewed for the Jefferson Scholarship, she already saw mathematics differently

than most people. "I find math beautiful," she says. "Mathematicians come up with new and creative ways to approach problems. If you're saying anything truly interesting, you're inventing a line of reasoning that no one else has used before. It is very much like art."

At the time, Catherine had only read about the beauty of high-level math, so she felt nervous as she signed onto Zoom. "Reading about it and doing it are two entirely different things," she notes. But her selection committee in Atlanta was supportive. "It was great to have my interviewers believe in me," she says. "They affirmed that this was something that I could pursue."

The committee's confidence was far from misplaced. This year, Catherine was awarded the Barry Goldwater Scholarship, one of the most significant honors for undergraduates studying math or science. In her research at UVA, she has forged novel connections between Fields Medal-winning theorems, and Ken Ono, STEM adviser to the provost and Catherine's mentor, has described her as an "international star undergraduate in mathematics." Among other topics, Catherine studies prime numbers, which are fundamental to mathematics but remain difficult for mathematicians to analyze, since there appears to be no regularity in the prime number sequence at all.

Catherine has led UVA's Association of Women in Mathematics chapter since she arrived at the University. In that time, she has virtually built the organization from the ground up, growing membership from around 10 to 120. "I care deeply about uplifting women who wish to pursue mathematical careers," she says, adding that she hopes the Goldwater Scholarship will inspire other undergraduate women to "dream big."

"Math makes you stronger," she continues. "You do one of the scariest things that a person can do, which is try to tackle some ancient, unknown problem. I want people to be able to find empowerment in it."

Grant GianGrasso

JS '24, Multilingual Researcher in Public Health

RHODES SCHOLAR | DR. RANDOLPH PRESTON PILLOW JEFFERSON SCHOLAR



To say that Grant GianGrasso has many interests is an understatement. A public health researcher working to become a physician, he is proficient in French, Spanish, and Bengali. He also plays jazz trumpet, dabbles in stand-up comedy,

and has served as a volunteer firefighter.

Grant told his interviewers for the Jefferson Scholarship that he wanted to pursue all of these interests. "I didn't want to sacrifice the passions that gave me joy," he says. One of the interviewers seemed amused by his "audaciousness," he remembers, but she quickly turned serious. "She said if there was anywhere I could make progress toward my career without losing sight of my other passions, it would be here," he recalls.

This year, Grant was one of 32 Americans to receive the coveted Rhodes Scholarship, which will help him pursue a master's degree in genomic medicine at the University of Oxford. A double major in human biology and French, he graduated in just three years and completed a master's degree in public health at the School of Medicine this May.

During his time as a Jefferson Scholar, Grant researched cryptosporidium, a lethal parasite for infants in lowincome countries, and founded *The Virginia Medical Review*, a student medical journal. He also played lead trumpet for UVA's Jazz Ensemble, won the University's Comedy Knight competition, and served as head resident of the French house.

The Jefferson Scholarship allowed Grant not only to follow his passions, but also to find connections between them. Through a study abroad experience funded by the Foundation, for example, he traveled to France, where he took a five-week course that helped him understand how the history of French colonization continues to influence global health issues.

Grant looks forward to a career where he can blend his various interests, treating diseases while also investigating their cures and communicating with patients in their native languages. As a Jefferson Scholar, he loved the opportunity to "study creatively," he says: "Rarely does anybody tell you that a particular combination of your passions won't fit together well. Instead, they help you brainstorm how your different interests interlock with each other."

Lisa Kopelnik

JS '25, Former Judiciary Committee Chair and Aspiring Judge

Lisa Kopelnik has long known that she wanted to study law. But in her first year at UVA, she started wondering if she should major in commerce instead. "It's easy to get overwhelmed by the number of options and the pressure coming from different directions," she says.

Then she ran into Ben Skipper, vice president of the Jefferson Scholars

Foundation. The two of them sat down together to discuss what was on her mind. "He said, 'There are people for whom business is their passion," Lisa recalls. "But it's something you've never expressed interest in.' That was a pivotal moment for me."

Lisa went on to serve as the youngest chair of the University Judiciary Committee to date. She speaks warmly of former Jefferson Scholars who served on that committee and continue to act as her mentors, explaining that they inspired her to join by sharing their own excitement about law. "They demonstrated an immense amount of passion for the work," Lisa says. "They told me how every single day, there's something different, and how you can impact people's lives for the better."

This spring, Lisa, who was recently appointed as the student representative to the Board of Visitors, became the 34th Harry S. Truman Scholar in UVA history. She will receive funding for graduate studies, leadership training, and career counseling, as well as special employment opportunities within the federal government. The award will support her on her path to public service, which Lisa says became clearer during her time at UVA: She now aspires to become a judge.

As chair of the Judiciary Committee, "I loved the chance to look students and staff in the eye and listen to what they had experienced, then figure out a resolution that made sense," she explains. "People coming through the court system are often at their most vulnerable, and I think we need judges who are empathetic. That's one of the main motivating factors for me."

Kristin O'Donoghue JS '24, Gender and

Technology Researcher

JAMES C. GAITHER JUNIOR FELLOW | JOHN PAUL Jones Jefferson Scholar



Kristin O'Donoghue was surprised to hear the word "love" come up multiple times in the talk she was attending. The speaker was information privacy expert Danielle Citron, the Jefferson Scholars Foundation Schenck Distinguished Professor in Law. "She framed artificial intelligence as impacting not only on our civil liberties,

but also the way we experience our private lives," Kristin recalls. "She was saying that it was harming our ability to love fully."

Drawn to this "distinctly human" framing of AI, Kristin began collaborating with Danielle as a research assistant. In that capacity, Kristin has examined threats that AI poses to female public figures, including journalists, politicians, and celebrities.

"A significant part of our relationships takes place online at this point in time," she says. "The public sharing and

spreading of nudes or doctored images, or even menstrual health data, is truly harmful to our ability to feel protected and express ourselves." For women in the public eye, Kristin notes, pornographic deepfakes and other deceptive online content pose very specific dangers: They could deter would-be politicians from running for office or even create a national security threat for officeholders, for example. "Gendered disinformation is having a real impact on women's roles in the public sphere," she says.

Kristin is co-founder of Students for Equity and Reform in Virginia, an organization dedicated to fighting for equitable state legislation, and has served on the board of the Charlottesville chapter of the National Organization for Women. She has also written for the *New York Daily News*, *VPM News, Cavalier Daily*, and *C-VILLE Weekly*.

Next year, Kristin will be one of 16 James C. Gaither Junior Fellows at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. She was selected from a pool of students nominated by hundreds of universities and will act as a research assistant in the Technology and International Affairs Program. Although she has not yet learned the specifics of her research, she looks forward to deepening her understanding of technology and policy.

"While technological innovation solves problems, it usually creates new ones in the process," Kristin says. "We need to seriously consider the harm that artificial intelligence might produce and who will be affected by it."

Maddie Stokes took five different classes in five different departments during her first semester on Grounds. "I have always loved school," she says, "so I thought, 'This is my opportunity to explore."

Maddie planned to eventually focus on studying politics, but she increasingly found that those courses felt like the wrong fit. After taking more English

classes, including a poetry workshop, Maddie realized she had discovered a better match.

"I am very enamored with language, but I didn't know that consciously until I started studying poetry," she explains. Still, she felt nervous to depart from her original plan. "I had convinced myself that politics was more important and more applicable," she says. Staff at the Jefferson Scholars Foundation were encouraging, however. "One thing the staff emphasized that really stuck with me was the value of pursuing paths that might not be linear but that can help you grow," she says.

That wisdom also prompted her to accept a Fulbright Scholarship to teach English in South Korea, rather than choosing to enter a literature Ph.D. program immediately after graduation. The Jefferson Scholars Program has produced 18 Fulbright Scholars over the years, and Maddie benefited from their example. "I would have never considered a program like that if I had not seen older Jefferson Scholars do it," she says.

A recipient of the English Department's Michael Wagenheim Memorial Scholarship, Maddie held various leadership positions within the Jefferson Literary & Debating Society starting in her second year at UVA. She was also a Lawn resident and enjoyed posting a "Poem of the Week" on her door to spark discussion.

The Jefferson Scholarship has helped Maddie orient toward the path that is right for her, she says: "No other opportunity would've given me people who were so deeply engaged in my development as a person."

Nathan started talking with former Scholars from a wide range of backgrounds who were passionate about these same questions, and he was quickly drawn to the world of criminal justice, especially public defense. This spring, Nathan was awarded the prestigious Knight-Hennessy Scholarship, which will support him in obtaining a law degree from Stanford University. "I plan to spend my career helping to change the criminal legal system for the better in places like my home state of Arkansas," he says.

Since graduating from UVA, Nathan has worked at Bain & Co., the Bail Project, and the law firm Atticus. But when he accepted the Knight-Hennessy, he had his experience as a Jefferson Scholar in mind. Belonging to a cohort of students with diverse academic interests enriched his experience, and he knows the Knight-Hennessy—which brings together students to pursue degrees across Stanford's seven graduate schools—offers something similar.

"It will enhance my exposure to ideas that are different from what I'm learning in a legal classroom," he says. "I don't come across many aspiring engineers, astronauts, or marine biologists in my current life, and it's exciting to know that's about to change."



In middle school, Nathan Abraham found himself on a distinct path from many of his peers. As a student on the pre-AP track, he was told that college was in his future. A good number of his friends, however, did not receive the same message. "If you're told as a sixth grader, 'College is maybe not the right fit for you,' it doesn't take much to believe that,"

Nathan says. "This was my first exposure to a massive racial wealth and opportunity gap in Arkansas."

Nathan reflected on this more deeply after he became a Jefferson Scholar. "I felt this sense of great injustice that I had gotten to study at UVA," he continues. "I explored questions like 'why did I have this opportunity when so many others didn't, and how can I spend the rest of my life trying to make sure that's not the case for future generations?""



Reimagining the Jefferson Fellowship

25 Years of Adapting to the Changing Landscape of Graduate Education



IN 1998, then-dean of the College and Graduate School of Arts & Sciences, Mel Leffler, approached the Jefferson Scholars Foundation with a proposition. Leffler and other administrators felt that UVA was losing top Ph.D. prospects to peer institutions and asked the Jefferson Scholars Foundation for assistance in helping to reverse the trend. At the time, the best fellowship package offered by the University was \$12,000 annually for three years, while many peer institutions were offering up to \$16,000 annually for five years.

"The Foundation's role, if we were to accept the dean's proposal," says Jimmy Wright, the president of the Foundation, "would be to underwrite a competitive financial package, which of course would require a substantial fundraising effort. We also would need to devise and administer the selection process."

It was a big ask. But the idea of forming a new merit graduate fellowship at UVA was compelling.

"The Foundation's Board of Directors ultimately came to see it as a natural extension of our mission. So, after some consideration, we agreed to help," says Wright.

stipend that started at \$16,900 in 2001 and gradually increased to \$30,000 by 2007. They also received a research stipend ranging from \$3,000 to \$7,500.

These multi-year packages allowed the Graduate School of Arts & Sciences to compete with offers from peer institutions and rapidly elevate the quality of its incoming graduate cohort—the number one priority of the school at the time.

Recognizing the value of a competitive financial package, the University eventually made graduate funding a priority and increased its own standard package for incoming graduate students. In doing so, the Jefferson Fellowship, in its original format, no longer provided the same competitive draw. Driven by both market forces and the changing needs of the University, the Foundation, in close partnership with school administration, reconfigured the Fellowship for the first time in 2016 and continued to fine-tune it over the ensuing years.

Today, the Jefferson Fellowship addresses a different set of issues than it did in 2001, providing much-needed dissertation completion and postdoctoral support. Current fifth-year Ph.D. candidates at

In fairly short order, the Foundation was able to secure approximately \$6 million—enough to launch the new Fellowship. In 2001, three years after the dean's request, the inaugural cohort of Jefferson Fellows matriculated at the University, and the Foundation officially ventured into the world of graduate support.

By 2006, UVA's Darden School of Business also approached the Foundation with a request to partner. And in 2012, the Graduate School of Engineering & Applied Science followed suit.

The Foundation quickly discovered that success in the graduate arena, especially across three schools, but most especially in the Graduate School of Arts & Sciences, would require a willingness to think creatively and strategically about how it operates. A 'one size fits all' approach was not going to work.

The Jefferson Fellowship for students in the arts and sciences was initially devised as a three-year and later a five-year package awarded at the point of admission. Candidates were nominated by department chairs and invited to make a 15-minute presentation and interview with a panel of UVA alumni and faculty. Those awarded the Fellowship received tuition, health insurance, and a living Recognizing the value of a competitive financial package, the University eventually made graduate funding a priority and increased its own standard package for incoming graduate students.

UVA can apply for the Fellowship, and, just as in the early years, they must make a 15-minute presentation followed by an interview as part of the selection process. Recipients are relieved of their departmental teaching requirements in the first year to ensure they have time to complete ambitious dissertations. In year two, they are given the opportunity to design their own courses and gain independent teaching experience as post-doctoral fellows at UVA.

Ben Skipper, who led the Jefferson Fellowship Program for nearly 10 years before the newly appointed director, Jamala Massenburg, took on the role, believes the Foundation's adaptability and willingness to restructure the Fellowship package is the very thing that has made the Jefferson Fellowship something of a secret weapon for UVA.

China Scherz, associate dean for graduate education in the Graduate School of Arts & Sciences, agrees.

"Today, many students find themselves at the end of their program needing just one more year to get it done. That's often precisely when they are left hanging, with no options for financial assistance. But the new format of the Jefferson Fellowship ensures that they can finish strong," she says.

Scherz adds that as important as financial support is, it is far from the only benefit of the Fellowship. One feature that has defined the Fellowship since the early-2000s is the fact that Fellows have access to-and in fact become an integral part of-the Foundation community.

"Graduate students don't typically have a platform to interact with scholars outside their department, and writing a dissertation is particularly isolating work. Jefferson Fellows don't have that problem," says Scherz.

The Foundation's building was designed to serve as a vibrant, interdisciplinary hub where Fellows could convene daily. The building's crown jewel, the Fellows Center, is equipped with state-of-the-art teaching and conference rooms, a reading room, a multi-purpose event hall, and informal communal spaces. Most notably, it features more than 20 offices that Fellows are invited to utilize if needed.

Kathryn Babineau, a Jefferson Fellow in sociology whose research examines labor rights, temporary migration, and public and private regulation, says one of the best parts about the Fellowship is working alongside historians, economists, and environmental scientists who help her reframe questions and expand the scope of her research.

Babineau was one of the Fellows selected to receive funding to organize the Forum for Interdisciplinary Dialogue, a conference held at the Foundation that brings together scholars across a wide range of fields and universities to address a selected topic of social or cultural significance.

process of planning and organizing a major academic conference," savs Babineau.

The Foundation also gives Fellows the opportunity to edit and manage an academic journal if they wish, as well as prepare and deliver academic talks as part of its ongoing symposia.

"The Jefferson Fellowship has come a long way over the last two decades, and we are confident that we are supporting these exceptionally talented graduate students exactly the way they need to be supported right now," says Wright.

Frederik's dissertation, "Rational Design of Xanthene-Based Photoacoustic Probes," delves into designing small-molecule dyes for photoacoustic imaging. In his work, he explores various strategies to create dyes that produce clearer and louder signals and demonstrate their potential for precise activation within acute myeloid leukemia cells. The Stains Lab's ongoing efforts aim to improve patient quality of life by potentially reducing the need for frequent bone marrow biopsies in monitoring acute myeloid leukemia. Frederik's work has been featured in respected publications such as *Chemistry—A European Journal* and *Photochemistry and Photobiology*. Next year, Frederik will be joining Oregon Health and Science University as a postdoctoral research fellow.

Lydia spent this year as a postdoctoral fellow in UVA's Engagements Program. Her dissertation, "Its Radiant Arms: Lyric and Novel in the Nineteenth Century," theorizes how the short lyric poem shaped the novel's forms, wants, and futures in the 19th century. 

History

How the National Fellowship is bringing a field of study back to the forefront



POLITICAL HISTORY is deeply embedded in nearly every aspect of American society. From education to healthcare, politics plays a powerful role in shaping the lives of Americans. Even popular culture is inextricably bound to politics. Countless films and television series gain critical and commercial success by drawing on the political turmoil of a given time. Late-night talk shows and satirical news programs rely on a daily influx of political fodder. The American public, it seems, has an insatiable appetite for consuming political content.

And yet, with history departments finally devoting long-overdue attention to subdisciplines like the history of gender, Black history, and cultural history, by the 1980s, American political history as a field of study began to enter a state of decline.

Brian Balogh, a professor at the University of Virginia, was determined to do his part to revive the field. He set out to establish a new graduate fellowship that would support doctoral candidates completing ambitious dissertations on topics pertaining to U.S. politics at home and abroad. The National Fellowship, as it was aptly named, was launched in 2000. From the outset, it was national in scope, supporting talented Ph.D. students at some of the world's top universities, not just at UVA, and pairing them with renowned senior scholars. These senior scholars, affectionately referred to as "dream mentors," would be handpicked by the Fellows and would play an integral role in reviewing and providing feedback to their research.

The program was designed by Balogh to create a network of historians, political scientists, and sociologists who sought to understand politics from a historical perspective. It also defined politics capaciously, drawing upon the energy and stature of fields like legal history and environmental history.

Today, the National Fellowship has engaged more than 150 dream mentors and supported approximately 200 rising historians and social scientists, 75 percent of whom have gone on to teach at major universities and hold tenure or tenure-track positions. Other National Fellows have forged equally successful careers in public service, the nonprofit sector, government, and other public-facing professions. Collectively, the National Fellowship community has published hundreds of books with major presses, many of which have garnered major awards.



Now under the leadership of James Sparrow, a history professor at the University of Chicago, and the Jefferson Jim Sparrow, director of the National Fellowship Program, addresses Fellows and guests in Foundation Hall.

Scholars Foundation, the National Fellowship Program promises to retain the signal features that have made it a success, as well as introduce new features in response to the changing landscape of graduate education.

"Graduate students who are getting tenure-line jobs today are getting them with sometimes two or three articles in top journals, before they even complete their Ph.D.," said Sparrow.

"Not that long ago, it wasn't a requirement or expected to have that type of coverage and experience under your belt."

That is partly why Sparrow is giving National Fellows more time, offering up to two years of support instead of just one.

American political history, it turns out, is more than just the perfect backdrop for the latest blockbuster biopic. "U.S. political history has always been central to a healthy civic culture," said Sparrow, "and we need it to grapple with our volatile, politically polarized world."

Based on the exceptional talent in this program, the National Fellowship Program will continue shining a bright light on that truth far into the future.

Robert's recently defended dissertation, "Reign of Terror': Anti-Civil Rights Terrorism in the United States, 1954-1976," explains how racial violence shaped the civil rights movement and U.S. political life more broadly. In the 1950s, hardline segregationists increasingly turned to clandestine acts of terror in order to suppress African American activists and their allies. From interviews, print and digitized sources, and records from 26 physical archives (including four overseas archives), Robert has compiled a dataset of nearly 900 anti-civil rights arsons and bombings-two of the most common terror tactics used against the movement. He argues that such terrorism was a national phenomenon that had international dimensions, varied according to local contexts, and contributed to the federalization of U.S. law enforcement. Robert has received support from 13 external fellowships and grants, and he has published publicfacing scholarship in the Washington Post and peer-reviewed articles in the Journal of American History and the Journal of Southern History. In August, Robert will join the University of Florida's history faculty as an assistant professor.
